INTRODUCTION TO THE CELEBRATION

Peace and all good to everyone. With great joy and enthusiasm, we begin the Month of Amigonianity 2026.

This year, as the Superiors General of our religious Congregations reminded us in their invitation letter, the Month of Amigonianity takes place within the 800th anniversary of the Transitus of Francis of Assisi and the 25th anniversary of the Beatification of the Amigonian Martyrs.

The life and spirit of Francis of Assisi were the source that inspired the life of Luis Amigó: his entire spiritual and apostolic experience is rooted in this man of the Middle Ages who, through his profound fidelity to the Gospel, remains to this day a credible and attractive witness not only for believers but for every person of good will.

The Amigonian Martyrs were men and women captivated by the charism of Father Luis, who welcomed the seed of the Gospel into their lives and cultivated it day by day amid the joys and sorrows, the successes and failures of human experience; and their martyrdom kindled in our Amigonian Family a light that can illuminate our lives and those of the people we meet along the way.

Francis of Assisi was a messenger of peace wherever he went; the Amigonian Martyrs were victims of a war that divided a country; and Father Luis always promoted reconciliation wherever there was discord and peace in the hearts of those who had suffered the effects of hatred, offering them affection and surrounding them with mercy.

May the Month of Amigonianity, which we enthusiastically inaugurate today, fill our hearts with peace and goodness, gifts of God for those who, like Father Luis, welcome Him into their lives, and make us feel close to those who suffer the devastating effects of human violence and selfishness. From Saint Francis, Father Luis, our Martyrs, and everything we will experience during this Month, we want to learn to be men and women who transmit to those around them the peace they carry in their hearts. A blessed Month of Amigonianity to everyone.

OPENING MONITION

We begin the Month of Amigonianity under the gaze of Our Lady of Sorrows.

We contemplate her sharing day by day in the redeeming mission of her Son Jesus: surprised and perhaps troubled as she listened to the prophecy of the elderly Simeon; filled with fear as she fled to Egypt with Joseph and the Child; worried when He, without telling her anything, had remained in the Temple; and overwhelmed with grief when she found Him going up to Calvary carrying the cross, accompanying His agony at the foot of the cross, receiving His lifeless body in her arms and laying it in the tomb, the last earthly dwelling of every human being.

As we joyfully begin this Month, we do not want to forget the thousands upon thousands of people who today experience in their own flesh the sorrows of Mary. Through this prayer we want to awaken and rekindle the trust

that suffering, and even death, do not have the final word over human life. This trust springs only from the faith that we want to nourish by drawing close to Father Luis and to his work in today's world.

READING (APOSTOLIC LETTER SALVIFICI DOLORIS, 31 - 1984)

Suffering certainly belongs to the mystery of the human person. Perhaps it is not surrounded, as the human person is, by that mystery which is particularly impenetrable. The Second Vatican Council expressed this truth: 'In reality, it is only in the mystery of the incarnate Word that the mystery of man truly becomes clear. For ... Christ, the new Adam, in the very revelation of the mystery of the Father and of his love, fully reveals man to himself and makes his supreme calling clear' (GS 22). If these words refer to everything that concerns the mystery of the human person, then they certainly refer in a very particular way to human suffering. Precisely at this point, 'revealing man to himself and making his supreme calling clear' is particularly indispensable. It also happens - as experience proves - that this is especially dramatic. But when it is fully realized and becomes light for human life, it is also especially joyful. 'Through Christ and in Christ, the riddles of sorrow and death grow meaningful.'

The mystery of the redemption of the world is wonderfully rooted in suffering, and suffering in turn finds in that mystery its supreme and most certain point of reference.

We wish to live this Year of Redemption in special union with all those who suffer. Therefore, all believers who suffer in Christ - especially those who suffer because of their faith in the Crucified and Risen One - should spiritually gather at the Cross of Calvary, so that the offering of their sufferings may hasten the fulfillment of the Savior's own prayer for the unity of all. People of good will should also gather there, because on the Cross is the 'Redeemer of man', the Man of Sorrows, who has taken upon himself the physical and moral sufferings of people of every age, so that in love they may find the saving meaning of their pain and valid answers to all their questions.

With Mary, Mother of Christ, who stood beside the Cross, we pause before all the crosses of the people of today.

TIME FOR SHARING. Questions that may help...

- Surely we have people near us, and have heard of others, who bear witness to overcoming suffering and who have emerged stronger from such situations. What keys have they shared with us? How did they become resilient?
- If suffering has the capacity to 'reveal man to himself', what truths about ourselves - strengths, weaknesses, or deeper desires - have come to light in moments of pain? What have we learned from our suffering?
- In a young people's world (and an adult world as well) that flees painful experiences, how can we integrate the experience of suffering (loneliness, lack of significance in the eyes of others, anonymity, bulimia...) as part of a 'life project' that can help or inspire the young people with whom we live?
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TIME FOR SHARING. Activity to carry out with children and adolescents: 'FROM THE HEAVY BACKPACK TO MISSIONARIES OF HOPE'

In the center or on a wall, place a large paper path with the words HEAVY BACKPACK - PATH - HOPE.

Explanation: We all have moments when our backpack feels heavier: when we are sad, worried, angry, when something does not go the way we want, when we argue with someone, or when we feel that nobody understands us. In that backpack we store many things from our lives: some make us happy and others are harder to carry. But when we feel this way, there are things and people that can help us keep walking.

First part: Cards with words or drawings are handed out and each person chooses: WHAT HELPS ME WHEN MY BACKPACK FEELS HEAVY?

Being listened to · being trusted · a hug · being given time · my friends · being encouraged · being able to talk · being forgiven · having another opportunity · feeling loved · doing something I enjoy...

They are placed along the path toward HOPE.

To reach hope, we often need someone who listens, accompanies us, is patient, and trusts us...

But there is something important: we can also be that person for someone else.

Then a sign is revealed: MISSIONARIES OF HOPE

What can it mean to be a 'missionary of hope'?

To be missionaries of hope is to stay close to people when they go through difficult times, helping them discover that they are not alone, that they matter, and that there is always a possibility of continuing to move forward.

It does not mean solving other people's problems. It means accompanying, listening, trusting, caring, forgiving, encouraging, and offering new opportunities.

It means continuing to believe in a person even when that person finds it difficult to believe in themselves. A missionary of hope is someone who helps another person keep going when their backpack is heavy.

MISSIONARIES OF HOPE 'Believe, accompany, and help others keep walking.'

A missionary of hope is someone who helps another person keep going when their backpack is heavy.

Second part: 'I CAN BE HOPE'

Now each person receives a paper footprint. It says: I CAN BE A MISSIONARY OF HOPE WHEN...

For example:

*...I listen to someone.
...I help a classmate.
...I do not laugh when someone is having a hard time.
...I ask for forgiveness.
...I give another opportunity.
...I accompany someone who is alone.
...I encourage someone who is sad.
...I try to make peace.
...I treat others well.*

Then each person places their footprint on the path. And here is the beautiful part: the path that at first led toward hope will now be formed by everyone's footprints.

The final mural could look like this:

📌 **WE ARE MISSIONARIES OF HOPE:** At some point we all need someone to help us keep walking. And we can all help someone else keep going.

Every time we make another person's backpack feel a little lighter, we are being missionaries of hope. Pain is not a dead end; it can open once again toward life.

The footprints visually represent the Amigonian way of accompanying and walking with the other.

TIME OF THANKSGIVING

- We thank you, Lord, because in the mystery of the Cross you fully reveal the human person to the human person; thank you because in our weaknesses you show us the greatness of our vocation and allow us to find a saving meaning in our pain. We thank you, Lord.
- Thank you, God of hope, because as your Psalm 126 says, you allow those who 'sow in tears to reap with songs of joy'; we bless you because no fatigue is in vain and because you turn our weeping into a goal of fruitfulness and peace. We thank you, Lord.
- We thank you, Father, for the resilience of our young people: grant them the ability to see in every difficulty a 'springboard' for their dreams, and allow them to transform their tears into a harvest of joy, making each trial a new and courageous life project. We thank you, Lord.
- We thank you, good Father, for the charism of Luis Amigó, which calls us as a charismatic family to be missionaries of hope in places where human suffering seems deepest. We thank you, Lord.
- We bless you because, through our Amigonian vocation, you teach us to recognize that pain is not a dead end, but a possibility for life. We thank you, Lord.
- Thank you for calling us to witness that you are not a judge who punishes, but the foundational strength that restores a person's confidence in themselves and invites them to live again. We thank you, Lord.
- Thank you, Lord, because in the faces of those who suffer - the marginalized, the stigmatized, and those who carry their crosses in solitude - you allow us to discover the mystery of your own presence. We thank you, Lord.
- We thank you for the commitment to be an Amigonian family that not only feels compassion but also educates and sets free, so that all your children may walk with heads held high, valuing every minute as a sacred gift. We thank you, Lord.
- Thank you, Lord, for Mary, Our Lady of Sorrows, who, remaining beside the Cross, teaches us not to flee from suffering but to pause before all the crosses of the people of today with love and dignity. We thank you, Lord.
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COMMITMENT to express how we have experienced this celebration

- Look within our personal history for those sufferings that we have not yet integrated or worked through and, presenting them to God in personal prayer, ask Him for healing and reconciliation.
- As teams of educators, centers, and schools, identify the fears and challenges we face in our work with our young people regarding some pressing issue or something that causes us unease.
- As a group of adults, identify in the neighborhood or in the reality where we live people who suffer loneliness, discrimination, or abandonment, and consider what we can do to support them.

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THANKSGIVING FOR LOVE AND FAITHFULNESS

**25th Anniversary of the Canonization of the Amigonian Tertiary Martyr Brothers and Carmen,
Laywoman**

INTRODUCTION

Brothers and Sisters:

We gather in solemn thanksgiving to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the canonization of the Capuchin Tertiary Brothers and Carmen, Laywoman, Amigonian Martyrs. We come before God with hearts filled with memory, gratitude and hope. These martyrs bore witness to Christ in the midst of suffering. They did not respond to violence with hatred or to fear with denial, but with faithfulness, love and forgiveness. Their lives remain a sacred sign that the Gospel is stronger than oppression and that the love of Christ is stronger than death.

Their witness reminds us that a life given out of love can become a seed of mercy. Like seeds sown in the earth, their lives were marked by suffering and sacrifice, but, by the grace of God, they have continued to bear fruit in the lives of countless people. Their courage, forgiveness and faith have become seeds that inspire us to live with compassion, to forgive generously and to draw near to those who suffer and are most in need of God's mercy.

The theme, “Lives as Seeds of Mercy”, invites us to look beyond the heroic witness of the martyrs and to ask ourselves: What kind of seeds are we sowing with our own lives? In our communities, in our families and, especially, in our service to others, may we sow seeds of kindness, compassion, forgiveness and hope. May our words bring comfort, may our presence bring peace, and may our actions reveal the merciful face of Christ.

The martyrs remind us that mercy is not simply something we receive; it is also something we are called to share. Their lives teach us that, even in the face of suffering, hatred and injustice, love can overcome, forgiveness can heal and mercy can bring new life.

In this memorial celebration, let us ask the Lord to renew in us the courage to live as faithful disciples and the grace to honor their witness, not only with our words, but also with our lives. May we too become seeds of mercy wherever the Lord has planted us, trusting that even the smallest act of love, when offered to God, can bear abundant fruit.

May the witness of our martyrs continue to inspire us to sow mercy, nourish hope and be instruments of God's compassionate love in our world.

The cross is carried in procession, followed by the Bible. Then a candle is lit in honor of the martyrs.

MONITION

The Cross

The cross is deeply linked to the martyrs, especially in the Christian tradition, because it symbolizes the supreme sacrifice for the faith. Their willingness to embrace suffering for love of Christ configures them to Jesus Christ crucified, the Martyr par excellence.

The Martyrs became a source of inspiration and strength for all believers. Therefore, the cross represents not only the sacrifice of Christ, but also the courage and steadfastness of those who remain faithful to their convictions, even to the point of giving their lives.

The Bible

We now receive the Word of God with reverence and gratitude. May the Holy Scriptures enlighten our hearts and guide our lives.

The Light

As a sign of faith, remembrance and hope.

As these candles are lit, we remember the martyrs whose lives burned brightly with love for Christ.

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LIVES THAT ARE SEEDS OF MERCY

Thanksgiving celebration for the 25th anniversary of the beatification of the Blessed Capuchin Tertiary Sisters of the Holy Family

Blessed Rosario de Soano, Serafina de Ochovi and Francisca Javier de Rafelbuñol
28 September 2026

Motto: *“We move forward together celebrating the gift of Life, united under a single motto: Lives that are seeds of mercy”.*

Sign for preparing the chapel: Three seeds, one Life

In a visible place in the chapel, prepare an earthenware container with soil. On it place three large seeds or three small pots identified with the names of **Rosario, Serafina and Francisca**. Beside them place a lit candle and a simple cross. At the foot may appear the phrase: **“What is given out of love does not disappear: it germinates”**. Around the container leave small grains of wheat that will be used at the end of the celebration.

The sign is very simple, but it contains the meaning of everything we are going to celebrate. A seed fits in the palm of the hand and apparently is very little; nevertheless, it holds life within it. To germinate it needs to fall into the earth, remain hidden, allow itself to be transformed and wait. In this image we can recognize something of the lives of Rosario, Serafina and Francisca. Three different women, each with her own character, history and way of serving, but united by the same vocation. Little by little, their lives entered the soil of prayer, fraternity, service and care for others, until reaching the definitive self-giving.

Opening monition

Dear Amigonian Charismatic Family, before us there is earth and there are seeds. Nothing extraordinary, and perhaps precisely for that reason this sign can speak to us so deeply. Jesus chose an equally simple image to express one of the deepest mysteries of the Gospel: a life given out of love does not end in itself, but becomes fruitful.

Rosario, Serafina and Francisca were learning this truth long before the moment of their martyrdom. They had given their lives many times before definitively giving their lives. They had given them in prayer, obedience, community service, care of the sick, education, accompaniment of the sisters, daily work and in so many small renunciations that will never appear written in a biography. The proper liturgy of their memorial beautifully sums up that whole existence when it recalls **Rosario, Serafina and Francisca as women who gave their lives to God**.

For this reason, today we give thanks. Thanks for their lives, for their fidelity and because those three seeds continue to be part of our history. But we also ask for the grace not to remain merely contemplating them. May their memory help us to look truthfully at our own vocation and personally hear a question that can accompany us throughout this celebration: **What am I sowing with the life God has given me?**

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

The Word of the Lord

Silence and reflection

Before us the three seeds are still there. Now they have names: **Rosario, Serafina and Francisca**. Three names that are part of the history of our entire Charismatic Family, but behind those names there were three real women, each with her own way of living, relating, serving, praying and also facing her own struggles.

Rosario: a life that learned to care

When we draw near to Rosario de Soano, we find a woman who knew responsibility and work from a very young age. Before leading communities she had learned to care; before receiving responsibilities within the Congregation

she had known the simplicity of family life and daily work. Over the years she took on important services, Perhaps there we find one of the seeds Rosario leaves in our hands: the more deeply God enters our life, the more human we should become. When persecution came, Rosario was among the last to leave the house in Massamagrell. That final self-giving did not appear suddenly. It had been prepared by many earlier acts of self-giving, by a life that little by little had learned to belong less to itself and to trust more.

Today Rosario could come close to each one of us and ask us something very simple: **After so many years walking with God, is my prayer making me more merciful?**

A moment of silence is kept.

Serafina: a life that learned to remain

Serafina had held important responsibilities and yet those who lived with her could also find her in the laundry, in the ironing room, mending clothes or doing whatever service was needed. Alongside that hardworking woman was the woman of prayer, the sister who sought the chapel, who found in the Eucharist and in the contemplation of Christ the strength to continue giving herself. When persecution came, she too remained with the community until the final moment.

Her life reminds us that we will not always have great events before us in which to demonstrate our fidelity.

Perhaps Serafina would ask us today: **What everyday service do I need to do again with love and not only because it is my duty?**

We keep silence.

Francisca: a life that learned to trust and forgive

And finally we meet Francisca, the youngest of the three. She was thirty-five years old when she died. Testimonies remember her as cheerful, joyful, close to young women and a lover of music. She played the piano, prepared songs, accompanied the girls and knew how to enjoy life together. She was also a woman of prayer, accustomed from an early age to seeking moments of silence and encounter with God.

Here her testimony touches something deeply evangelical. Forgiving in that way is not learned a few minutes before dying. It is learned throughout life. It is learned when we stop keeping small unsettled accounts, when we refuse to classify people according to a wound from the past, when we stop feeding conversations that divide, when we speak again after a disagreement, and when we allow mercy to carry more weight than our desire to be right.

Perhaps Francisca can ask us today: **What do I need to let go of in order to love with greater freedom?**

A longer silence is kept.

The grain of wheat

After drawing a little closer to their lives, we can return to the Gospel. The grain of wheat does not fall into the earth because death is good or because suffering has value in itself. It falls because it carries life within it and that

life is called to open up. Jesus does not invite us to seek suffering; he invites us to love in such a way that our main concern ceases to be preserving ourselves.

That is what Rosario, Serafina and Francisca did. They did not seek death. They sought Christ. And in seeking Christ they learned to give their lives: first in small things, then in more demanding ones, until reaching the definitive self-giving. The spirituality of martyrdom gathered in the *Amigonian Martyrology* understands martyrdom precisely as an encounter between the grace of God and a free and generous human response.

For this reason, twenty-five years after their beatification, perhaps the most important question is not only how Rosario, Serafina and Francisca died. The question their witness leaves today in the midst of our fraternity is much closer: **How are we living?**

Time for sharing

After the silence we open a space for fraternal conversation God is currently inviting us to care with greater tenderness, like Rosario; what everyday service we need to carry out again with love, like Serafina; what fear, wound or resistance we need to surrender in order to live with greater freedom, like Francisca. And together we can ask ourselves one final question: **if someone entered one of our Amigonian Charismatic Family groups today, what would they have to find in order to be able to say that Rosario, Serafina and Francisca are still alive among us?**

Time of thanksgiving

After remembering, listening and allowing their stories to draw close to ours, we simply want to give thanks. We give thanks for Rosario, for that strong and maternal woman, for her capacity to care, accompany and serve the Congregation without losing closeness to the sisters. We give thanks for Serafina, for her hardworking hands, for her fidelity, for her love of poverty, for her hours of prayer and for so many everyday services that perhaps no one would have written in a book. We give thanks for Francisca, for her youth, for her joy, for music, for the girls and young women she accompanied, for her moments of silence, for her fears and for the inner freedom that finally made her capable of forgiving.

After each thanksgiving, or at the end of each spontaneous intervention, we respond:

R/. Thank you, Lord, because their life continues to germinate.

Commitment: Sow what I want to continue living

Before approaching the soil, each one can ask herself: **What do I want to sow in my Amigonian Charismatic Family group?** She can inwardly choose a word that expresses her commitment: mercy, listening, patience, joy, reconciliation, tenderness, service, availability, hope, fraternity, forgiveness or welcome. Then, one by one, the sisters approach and place their seed in the soil. It is not necessary to say the chosen word publicly. The commitment remains between God and each person.

Final prayer

Lord Jesus, today we want to thank you for Rosario, Serafina and Francisca. Thank you because before being Blessed they were sisters, because they knew life with its joys and its weariness, because they worked, held

responsibilities, prayed, cared, learned, at times were afraid and kept walking. Thank you because when the definitive hour arrived, they discovered that a whole life given away had prepared them for a greater self-giving.

Final gesture

The sister leading the celebration takes a little soil in her hands and leaves a few moments of silence. Then she says: “This soil now holds our seeds. We do not know what will happen to them, just as we do not always know what fruit will come from what we give each day. But we can trust. The seed does its work in secret and God knows the times of life”.

Then she proclaims: **Rosario de Soano**. All respond: “**Teach us to care by giving our life**”. She continues: **Serafina de Ochovi**. All respond: “**Teach us to serve by giving our life**”. Finally: **Francisca Javier de Rafelbuñol**. All respond: “**Teach us to forgive by giving our life**”.

The leader concludes: **Blessed Martyrs, Capuchin Tertiary Sisters of the Holy Family, pray for us**.

And all together respond:

“So that our life too may bear fruit”.

At the end, the whole community proclaims:

“Lives that are seeds of mercy”.

To take into life

As she leaves the chapel, each sister may receive a small card with a seed attached. On the front it may say: “**What is given out of love germinates**”. Below: **Rosario: care. Serafina: remain. Francisca: forgive**. On the reverse, only one question: “**And I, what am I sowing?**” (Jn 12:24).

Setting

After the proclamation of the Word or the reading about the final moments of Father Luis Amigó, the lights are dimmed. At the center, a candle remains lit beside a seedling or a small plant, a sign of life that continues making history fruitful.

Introduction

Father Luis Amigó understood that a life given to God never ends. Like the seed that disappears beneath the earth to bear fruit, his existence continues germinating there where someone consoles, educates, forgives, accompanies, or restores hope.

Today we contemplate his Transitus not as an end, but as the culmination of a life sown with generosity. We too are called to be seeds of mercy in the midst of the world.

A moment of silence is observed.

Questions for personal reflection

They are read slowly, leaving a few moments between one and the next.

- What seeds of mercy did Father Luis Amigó sow that continue bearing fruit today in my life and in our community?
- What seeds am I sowing each day with my words, my decisions, and my service?
- Is there any soil in my heart that needs to be turned over so that mercy can flourish?
- If my journey ended today, what fruit would I leave sown in those around me?

A prolonged period of silence is observed (5-7 minutes), accompanied only by soft instrumental music.

SONG

«Alma Misionera»

It emphasizes the self-giving of one who lives to sow the Kingdom.

TIME FOR SHARING

The facilitator

Father Luis Amigó taught us that mercy is transmitted from heart to heart. Seeds make no noise as they grow, yet they transform the earth.

Let us now share those seeds of mercy that God has sown in our lives.

Capuchin Tertiary Sisters - Capuchin Tertiary Religious

Questions for sharing

Each person responds briefly to one of these questions:

- What trait of Father Luis Amigó do I wish to continue sowing?
- What experience of mercy has most marked my life?
- What concrete commitment do I want to make in order to continue making the Amigonian charism fruitful?

Community gesture

As each person shares, they place their seed around a plant

At the end, the facilitator says:

No seed seems important when it falls to the earth. But together they form a field full of life. In the same way, Father Luis Amigó humbly sowed the Gospel, and today we gather its fruits wherever it is sown.

May the Lord grant us the grace to continue making the charism we have received flourish.

Final prayer All together:

Lord Jesus,

thank you for the life of Father Luis Amigó,

fruitful seed of mercy,

shepherd according to your heart

and servant of the little ones.

Grant that we too

may know how to sow hope where there is discouragement,

reconciliation where there is division,

tenderness where there is suffering,

and faith where many have ceased to believe.

May our life,

like his,

be a hidden seed,

humble and fruitful,

capable of continuing to bear fruit for your Kingdom.

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CELEBRATION OF THE 172ND ANNIVERSARY OF THE BIRTH OF FATHER LUIS

Setting: place an image of Father Luis Amigó with some sign that makes his birth visible.

INTRODUCTION

...the Lord, in his mercy, gave me very Catholic parents, named Don Gaspar Amigó y Chulvi, a lawyer, son of Puzol, and Doña Genoveva Ferrer y Doset, from Valencia. And because my father was for some time secretary in Masamagrell, ***I was born in that town on 17 October 1854.*** And so that the special ***mercy of the Lord*** toward me may be seen, I must state that in that year the towns were being struck by a very terrible cholera epidemic, from which most pregnant women died before or during childbirth. For this reason, the people of the town, who were very fond of my mother, were saddened and lamented seeing her so far advanced in her pregnancy, judging her death almost certain. But the Lord had compassion on my virtuous mother, and she gave birth to this poor creature without any mishap. (OC, Autobiography, n. 2 and 3).

OPENING MONITION

Today we gather as the Amigonian Charismatic Family, with hearts overflowing with joy and gratitude, to celebrate a truly special occasion: the 172nd anniversary of the birth of our Founding Father.

These are 172 years embraced by the faith, grace, guidance and strength of a God who has loved Father Luis with “a heart full of mercy” since his birth; a significant fact that he himself recognizes as a special ***mercy of the Lord*** in his personal history.

Friar Luis was a man who, despite his limitations and vulnerabilities, was able to embrace the cross of Christ and give himself completely to the service of the Kingdom of God. As we contemplate the passing of time, we remember with affection the kind and peaceful man, austere Capuchin and popular missionary, simple bishop and devout Shepherd, yet always prudent, even-handed, respectful, self-sacrificing, filled with serene strength and deeply trusting in Providence, devoted to his ministerial priesthood, who with these qualities began this path and sowed the seeds of mercy that today continue to blossom and give life in our two Congregations and among lay people who embrace with a sense of belonging this rich charism of mercy, given to the Church for her sanctification.

But this day is not only for remembering the past; above all, it is an invitation to look toward the future with hope and to renew our Christian commitment to live the virtue of mercy. May this celebration be a song of praise for every blessing received and a supplication that the Holy Spirit may continue to guide our steps as a family within the Church.

PROCLAMATION OF THE PSALM: 145. (for two choirs, and after every two stanzas the following antiphon is repeated: "The Lord is compassionate and merciful; he supports those who are about to fall and lifts up those who are bowed down")

Introduction: this psalm shows us that, in Jesus, mercy is part of his unconditional love for the dignity of the human person; he allows himself to be moved with compassion in the face of suffering, illness and exclusion.

BIBLICAL READING:

MOTIVATION:

In the Gospels, Jesus is shown moved by compassion, displaying a profound physical and emotional reaction to the pain, illness or need of his neighbor, always impelling him toward transformative action and direct help.

PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD: Mc 6,34

“When he disembarked, he saw a great crowd and had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things”.

REFLECTION AND SILENCE

Mercy begins with “seeing”. Jesus does not pass by. He sees people who are tired, lost and wounded, and his heart is moved.

Jesus' compassion does not remain mere pity. He begins to teach them and then gives them food.

The world is still “without a shepherd”: violence, addictions, loneliness. Jesus calls us to be shepherds with him.

In Jesus, mercy is the expression of his unconditional love and his profound respect for the dignity of the human person. He teaches us to allow ourselves to be moved with compassion by the needs of our world, becoming seeds of mercy through concrete attitudes such as welcome, sensitivity and charity toward those who live in situations of exclusion and whose dignity has been violated. We are invited not to condemn, but to teach, accompany and embrace.

We ask ourselves:

How are we living today, as the Amigonian Charismatic Family, the mercy of Jesus in situations that violate people's dignity, especially the dignity of those who suffer, are excluded or live in situations of greater vulnerability?

SONG: To the Holy Spirit (chosen freely)

CHARISMATIC READING: OC 1063

“...beloved children; it is also necessary that our charity toward our neighbor be made known through deeds: providing them comfort in their afflictions, remedy in their illnesses and assistance in their need. Is this not what we ourselves desire and seek so earnestly for ourselves? If our spirit is cast down and afflicted by some tribulation, with what eagerness do we not seek the comfort of a friend, pouring out our heart to him?; if we feel ill, we want others to help us and promptly and diligently apply the necessary remedies for our recovery, and in our hardships and needs, how well we know how to set them forth so as to **move our neighbors to compassion** and find help in them! Well then: let us have this same concern for our brothers, whom we must love not only in word, but also and above all in deeds: *Non diligamus uerbo, sed opere et veritate* (1 lo 3, 18)”.

REFLECTION AND SILENCE:

Although the text is from the nineteenth century, it still challenges today the living core of our charism: mercy made concrete in compassion and in service to the brother who suffers. Father Luis begins from a fundamental conviction: Christian charity cannot remain in words, feelings or good intentions; it needs to be expressed in concrete deeds. He translates charity into three very close and human actions: comforting the afflicted, caring for the sick and helping those who live in need. In this way, mercy takes on a concrete and close face.

There is a particularly powerful element in the text: the invitation to put oneself in the place of the other. Father Luis reminds us that all of us, when we suffer, seek comfort; when we fall ill, we hope someone will care for us; when we are in need, we want to find someone who has compassion on us.

That is why, at heart, he asks: if we expect mercy in our moments of fragility, how can we not offer it to our brothers?

The expression that may resonate with particular force today is: “move our neighbors to compassion”. In Father Luis's context, compassion is not simply feeling pity in the face of another person's suffering. It is allowing oneself to be touched inwardly by the other's situation until one moves toward them and acts on their behalf. Compassion thus becomes a transformative force: seeing, feeling, drawing near and doing something concrete.

Today there are still people who need comfort, sick people who await closeness, excluded people who need to be welcomed, wounded families who require accompaniment, and human beings whose dignity has been violated. Therefore, Father Luis's question remains open for us: How are we making visible today the mercy we receive from God?

Therefore, as we celebrate another anniversary of the birth of our Founding Father, the text not only reminds us of his teaching, but also transmits to us an inheritance that continues to challenge the Amigonian Charismatic Family: to keep his merciful heart alive: to allow ourselves to be touched by the suffering of our brothers, to be moved to compassion and to transform that feeling into concrete deeds of comfort, care, welcome and service.

In the face of the suffering of our brothers and sisters, what is compassion doing in us today?
